

Catalog Course Description

A survey of film as art from both historical and cultural perspectives, including attention to film theories and criticism. The course is an introduction to film analysis, aesthetics, and philosophy from a Christian worldview. Credit may count toward the general education artistic expression requirement. This course is a survey of the medium of film as an art form. Cultural, historical, financial, and aesthetic factors that affect the medium will be discussed from a Christian worldview. The study of history and the current state of filmmaking will be a part of the student's class experience. Students will be given opportunities to learn about film through class participation, reading texts and articles, writing a paper, and critiquing films. (Writing proficiency required.)

Course Format

The course is seated in a classroom for instruction and training on Mondays and Wednesdays. Friday classes are given online as either presentations and/or assignments. Students will complete assignments on their own time as they are assigned.

Course Requirements

The class will include the reading of the textbooks (outside class) with follow-up assignments. All written or out-of-class assignments will be used as a basis for the class discussion. Students will complete the following major assignments (smaller, daily work may also be assigned):

- 1. Attendance. Students are required to attend class each time it meets. Absences should be used only for illness or unavoidable conflicts. Keep in mind this is a hybrid course that meets two days a week then has an online activity for the third class meeting (Fridays). Expect an online activity or assignment for this meeting most weeks.
- **2. Reading**. Students are required to read the assigned chapters of the texts as indicated in the course outline.
- **3. Film Analyses**. Each student will view and analyze **two films** from movies approved by the professor using criteria discussed in class including how the film presents a particular worldview. One of the films analyzed must be foreign-made. A format for these analyses will be given in class. Each analysis must be uploaded to Canvas on the date due or before.
- **4. Book Response**. Each student will write a response to the book by Robert Johnston. The response should be 4 to 5 pages in length, double-spaced. Students should summarize the ideas of the book and discuss their own agreement or disagreement with Johnston's ideas from a scholarly point of view. In addition, the student will use the book's principles to "dialogue" with a film. Films chosen for this paper should be listed in the AFI top 100. This paper must be uploaded to Canvas.
- **5. Theory Paper.** Students are required to write a paper that critically evaluates an approved film (one not seen by the student prior to taking this course) using one of the theories presented in class. More details of this assignment will be given in class. Proper APA or MLA style will be required approx. 5 pages in length. This paper must be uploaded to Canvas by the date due.
- **6. Exams and Online Quizzes.** Two tests will be given during the semester one at midterm, the other at finals. Online quizzes over reading material will be given using Canvas/Norton. Students are required to login to Canvas and take the quizzes **before class on the day due**. Students should frequently login to Canvas to check for assignments. Online quizzes cannot be taken late.

7. **Online assignments**. Using the Canvas course software, online assignments will be given as scheduled as part of class activity on Fridays/weekends. It is important to the student's grade to complete these assignments and turn in on-time. These will be listed on Canvas through the course.

Attendance

Students are required to attend class each time it meets. Absences should be used only for illness or unavoidable conflicts. Only excused absences will be allowed to make up work missed during an absence. Students have a <u>maximum of 5 absences</u> during the semester. On the sixth absence, the student may be dropped from the course. Any student needing to leave class early should notify the professor. Leaving class for bathroom breaks, cell phone calls, etc. is not acceptable. Please take care of your personal business between classes. Keep in mind this is a hybrid course that meets two days a week then has an online activity for the third class meeting (Fridays). Expect an online activity or assignment for the Friday meeting most weeks.

Electronic Devices In The Classroom

It is expected that electronic devices will be used during class to support the students' learning for this class only. Any use of technology that substantially degrades the learning environment, becomes a distraction, promotes dishonesty or illegal activities is prohibited.
